Introduction

Ofsted's latest Education Inspection Framework (EIF) has recently been published, and the personal development of students is included as a new area for inspection.

The EIF states that schools should create a curriculum that goes beyond the academic and promotes students' broader development by helping them build the cultural capital, resilience, confidence, and independence they need to succeed in life.

Ofsted also states that your curriculum should help students grow into responsible citizens who contribute to society, appreciate diversity and celebrate what we have in common.

The EIF emphasises that it's the range of personal development opportunities that your school offers to students which will be measured and assessed, rather than your students' personal development itself.


Inspectors Are Looking For...

The EIF states that Ofsted inspectors will look at how well your school promotes students' moral, social and cultural education.

This means that students should be able to reflect on their own worldviews, be respectful of other people's faiths, and enjoy learning about the world around them. They should also be able to use their social skills to work with those from different religious, ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds, and be interested in exploring different cultures.








The Impact of Learning Outside the Classroom

Giving students the chance to take their learning outside the classroom through school trips helps them develop a deeper understanding of their place in the world, cement their learning with real-world experiences, and build confidence and independence.

In fact, a recent study by Oxford Home Schooling found that nearly half of parents think their children learn more from school trips than in the classroom, and 34% believe there should be more trips offered as part of the curriculum. Another survey found that 66% of secondary students thought they were better at problem-solving and would do better in their exams after a school trip, whilst 87% said their trip made them feel more confident trying new things.



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
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Giving Students the Skills to Grow

This is backed up by our own survey, which found that 97% of our volunteers felt their trip had given them the confidence to try new things.

Additionally, 98% of our volunteers said their trip gave them a deeper understanding of the wider world, 96% felt their trip helped them develop new skills for later life, and 96% felt their trip enabled them to grow in terms of personal development.

Finally, Ofsted itself has highlighted the importance of learning outside the classroom, stating that, "learning outside the classroom contributed significantly to improving pupils' personal, social and emotional development."



Romsey have travelled with us since 2013, and over 200 students have benefitted from the experience of volunteering in Kenya.
